FY2019 was a banner year for Girls Incorporated of St. Louis. Not only did we increase the number of girls served, dollars raised and our reserves, but we also had the largest number of girls attending college in our history. While this time was filled with many exciting opportunities that are highlighted in this report, much has changed in 2020.

We began 2020 with the momentum of the previous year but quickly had to pivot in response to the global Covid-19 pandemic. Since March, we have created committees and a playbook to ensure our high-quality programming remains. From our first all-virtual program to greater emphasis on mental health and trauma, Girls Inc. has continued to put our girls first and to educate them while maintaining their safety. Furthermore, we were one of the first nonprofits to receive Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funds, allowing us to retain our entire staff and continue providing meaningful programs to our girls.

Now, more than ever, it is critical that we are here for our girls and keep our doors metaphorically open. The swift and effective transition to virtual programming would not have been possible without the support and contribution of our partners, supporters, staff and families. The process of adapting to the coronavirus public health crisis has shown us all the importance of being Strong, Smart and Bold through any challenge. That is why this special edition annual report honors and commemorates the hard work of many. It is our way of acknowledging the difference all of you make at Girls Inc.

Thank you for your dedication and assistance as we support our girls through this transformational and critical time.

## Mission

The mission of Girls Incorporated of St. Louis is to provide educational, recreational, and cultural programs to girls in a safe environment; to enable them to raise their aspirations and realize their potential. Girls Inc. inspires all girls to be strong, smart and bold.

## Six Essential Elements

Our Girls Inc. Experience has six essential elements that equip girls to navigate gender, economic and social barriers and to grow into healthy, educated and independent adults:

- Girls-only environment
- Mentoring relationships
- Intentional programming
- Research-based curricula
- Interactive activities
- Sustained exposure

Together these elements provide a holistic approach grounded in a belief in girls' rights and abilities.



## Responding and Connecting During the Covid-19 Pandemic

Girls Inc. responded to the Covid-19 pandemic with great determination to continue serving our members. As the pandemic became a more dire public health emergency, we quickly pivoted to meet our members' new needs. Recognizing that this pandemic impacted all aspects of life, we established programs to address food insecurity, mental health and social wellbeing, safety and educational needs.

In response to the Covid-19 pandemic, Girls Inc. has:

- Provided 1,000 meals to our girls and their families
- Created virtual programs about mental health and coping skills
- Implemented online programming and daily virtual education for 100 girls
- Called over 1,500 families to check in, assess needs and share resources
- Kept our entire staff, all of whom are working remotely

Girls Inc. leadership brought together individuals from every walk of life and various professions, from lawyers to educators, to review and update our Business Continuity Plan. We created a Playbook that guides all of our organizational response efforts. Our Crisis Management Team met daily to ensure we were keeping the girls and staff safe.

Transitioning to an entirely virtual model has been the safest and most effective option to continue serving our girls. Thanks to generous donations, we were able to provide over 50 laptops, web cameras and Wi-Fi to our members and their families. Even during a pandemic, Girls Inc. remains committed to breaking down any barriers between girls and the education they deserve.

Girls Inc. is stronger because of how we have reacted to the Covid-19 pandemic. This transitional time has encouraged us to think big, innovate and adapt our methods in order to give our members the best experience possible. Distance is no longer an issue. We will continue to provide for young women no matter where they are.

## Our First Virtual Program

Girls Inc. has been able to stay connected with our members and continue providing enriching educational opportunities with our first virtual program. Though the structure was new, our team's enthusiasm and commitment to our girls remained. Our staff has successfully transferred their strong connections with girls in the classroom to an online setting. With this foundation, Girls Inc. has succeeded in creating an engaging and effective virtual learning environment.

We were able to reach over 400 hundred young people with an online summer program carefully crafted with each girl in mind! Girls Inc. families shared their appreciation of the virtual program, noting that their daughters would awake every morning excited to get on their computers and learn all day long.

Our virtual program has created an opportunity for us to cater to the social needs of our students and create an environment where they can learn and engage with their peers. Students have been able to complete lessons and fun activities, including science experiments and hands on projects, safely.

While many things are changing, one thing has stayed consistent: our care for our girls. Service and love for our girls will always be the primary focus for Girls Inc. Therefore, we will be continuing our virtual program in Fall 2020 and keeping our promise to educate and support girls.

## Mobilizing Around Mental Health

During the Covid-19 pandemic, many of our youth have been facing new and greater challenges. At Girls Inc., we are committed to nurturing and supporting the "whole girl," including their mental health and social wellbeing. We have equipped our girls with the tools they may need to cope with stressors and to communicate effectively their needs around mental wellbeing.

During the pandemic, the GirlTalk program was created and implemented by volunteer Brittany Jones, MSW, LCSW. GirlTalk was specifically designed to help middle school and high school students become comfortable identifying their emotions and communicating about their feelings. During this program, the girls reflected and discussed how to have challenging conversations about mental health with their family, friends and trusted adults.

Mental health has been a pillar in the Girls Inc. approach even before the pandemic. Girls had the opportunity to engage with two Ph.D. social workers in a group and individually. The girls learned about general wellbeing, how to identify and cope with stressors and suicide prevention. In addition to working with mental health professionals, Girls Inc. promotes healthy mindsets by incorporating mental health lessons into the classroom. Classes like Mathematical Courage teaches girls to be resilient as they learn and manage difficult emotions. By focusing on culture and positive relationships, girls are building the foundation for their mental wellbeing at Girls Inc.





## Our Alumnae

### **KEARSTYN RICHARDSON, JACKSON STATE UNIVERSITY, CLASS OF 2021**

Chemistry Major, Biology Minor, Pre-Medicine Concentration

Kearstyn Richardson draws inspiration from her experiences to improve the world. Beginning as a group project at Girls Inc., Kearstyn created Here for You, an app that virtually connects families with incarcerated relatives for milestones, celebrations and other shared experiences. Kearstyn's father has been incarcerated for most of her life and she wanted to create a way for him to be present for her younger sisters. Kearstyn realized many other families with incarcerated relatives can benefit from this app and Here for You is being further developed. "Life is too short. We need to cherish every single moment," Kearstyn reflected.

Kearstyn has dreamed of becoming an OB/GYN ever since her younger sister was born. As she wraps up her final year at Jackson State University, Kearstyn will be starting the medical school application process. During her 15 years at Girls Inc., Kearstyn was a recipient of the Betty Sims scholarship and learned about managing money and the importance of sisterhood. She has returned to Girls Inc. as a facilitator in the Economic Literacy course to impart the lessons she has learned to the next generation of young women at Girls Inc.



### **DEJA STRONG, ALABAMA A&M UNIVERSITY, CLASS OF 2021**

Social Work Major, Biology Minor



Deja Strong has found her voice as a leader in her community. At Alabama A&M University, Deja founded a student-led organization called Speak Up Act Out that identifies and works towards solutions for social injustices. By fostering productive dialogue, Deja succeeds in spreading awareness and knowledge to create the change she wants to see in the world. In addition to spearheading Speak Up Act Out, Deja is a Senator for Academic Affairs in Student Government Association, a member of the Honors Program and a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. This summer, Deja held an internship position at the City of St. Louis Mayor's Office, working to improve community health and child education.

Deja's natural affinity for leadership was cultivated in her 12 years at Girls Inc. and has continued as a volunteer and teacher at Girls Inc. According to Deja, "the best leaders make leaders." As a facilitator at Girls Inc., Deja is grateful to play a part in her students' growth as learners and as leaders.

## Teacher Spotlights

### MS. ANDREA WOOLFOLK

Ms. Woolfolk has been with Girls Inc. for ten years and is a kindergarten and first grade teacher, facilitator supervisor and a champion of the girls with whom she works. Because she works with our youngest members, Ms. Woolfolk plays a crucial role in her students' development and sets the foundation of what it means to be Strong, Smart and Bold.

Many of Ms. Woolfolk's students enter the classroom not knowing the alphabet and leave recognizing words and reading intermediate level books. Through exploration and engaging activities, her students learn leadership, effective communication tools, self-esteem, self-love and self-awareness. Ms. Woolfolk is driven and encouraged by her students' love for learning.

"[My students] are the youngest girls in the building so I feel like I am an important part of their lives because I am the first facilitator that they see when they step into the building. I have to make sure I give them the best Girls Inc. experience because when I do, it makes them want to come back to Girls Inc. and experience what else Girls Inc. has to offer," Ms. Woolfolk shared.



### MR. JERRY STEWART

Mr. Jerry Stewart, our computer facilitator of six years, has done a remarkable job teaching our STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) courses. As a 4th and 5th grade teacher, Mr. Stewart teaches his students keyboarding, web page development and coding. This year, he combined themes like astronauts, science and technology into students' coding curriculum.

In the classroom, Mr. Stewart uses creative methods to develop students' coding skills and logical thinking, while building character. With a combination of verbal direction and hands-on learning, he creates a holistic learning environment where students can thrive and gain skills for personal and professional success. Additionally, Mr. Stewart incorporates art into coding and includes elements of creativity into each lesson. "This is the 21st century - this is technology - it is the way the world is going and we are preparing our young ladies for the future," said Mr. Stewart. "It starts right here at Girls Inc."

Mr. Stewart hopes to embolden his students and instill a sense of pride within their work. He knows that each girl in his class is Strong, Smart and Bold and he wants them to believe it for themselves.

## Travelers Leadership Academy

In August 2018, Travelers partnered with Girls Inc. to facilitate the second Travelers Leadership Academy, designed to empower young women and help them make the best financial and educational choices. The Academy prepared 150 young women for their future by teaching them about personal banking, credit, student loans, insurance, interviewing skills and college readiness.



## Partnership With University of Missouri – St. Louis

Dr. Keith Miller, the University of Missouri - St. Louis' (UMSL) Orthwein Endowed Professor for Lifelong Learning in the Sciences, is a strong advocate of STEM education and a loyal supporter of Girls Inc. In XXXX, Dr. Keith and UMSL collaborated with Girls Inc. to develop the Eureka! Program, designed for eight and ninth grade girls. The program exposes young women to the STEM field through engaging projects and activities while introducing them to college environments and college level content. Their recent donations of science kits, books and time has helped us to continue introducing STEM and higher education to young women, despite the pandemic.

## The Race is on at the World Wide Technology Raceway!

In August 2019, a team of Eureka! STEM students visited the World Wide Technology Raceway in Madison, Illinois and competed in the Junior 500 Race. As the only all-women's team and one of the only diverse teams present, the Girls Inc. team broke down barriers while putting their STEM knowledge to work. In the three day event, the girls designed and built their go-cart, learned how to drive the raceway and raced against other teams. On race day, they were able to see their product in motion when Kayla Payne drove #62 and emerged a victor winning the Best Driver and Safety in Driving Award.



## Recognition of Girls Inc.'s Mission, Values and Impact

Cheryl Jones, President & CEO of Girls Inc. of St. Louis, was recognized as a St. Louis Business Journal's Diverse Business Leaders 2019 honoree. This award, established over a decade ago, honors those who promote diversity around race, sexual orientation and disability in the St. Louis region.

## Alumni Care Packages






## Financial Summary




## Ending Assets for FY 2019

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
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
